Helping Children Learn At Home

Encourage active listening:

Listen to your child's ideas and respond. This type of giveand-take at home is likely to help your child participate and be interested at school. How can I help my child at home? Young children can be helped in many ways. Here are some general suggestions for starters:

Subscribe to a newspaper and point out interesting information.

Play card games with your children to strengthen memory and problem-solving.

Set up a card table with a jigsaw puzzle on it and work on it daily, a little at a time to develop location skills and identification of shapes (which helps with reading).

Go grocery shopping with your children, and let them be involved in finding specific items.




Let your children sort the clean socks from a load of laundry (good categorization skill). Teach your children the proper way to answer the phone and take messages.

Get a public library card and bring your child to the library regularly.

Enjoy learning about what your child is doing each day.
